Because of this, my colleagues and I have embarked upon a renewal, focused on the theme of DO EVEN MORE, as today we have opportunities that we have not had in sometime to meet and walk with students as they seek answers to fundamental human questions intensified by the last two years. DO EVEN MORE, while uniquely Rochester as it speaks to our Meliora values and motto, is more than just a cute slogan. It is a call to reengage students, bringing them to Christ where they can find healing, peace, hope, and the pathway to a fulfilling life.



### Yes Pa Program Blessed with Four Grants!

Over this past year, the Yes Pa Program, as a part of Newman's St. Sebastian

Society for Varsity and Christian Athletes, has had monumental success in securing financial security for its future projects and alliance with the Boys & Girls Clubs of Rochester (through a project entitled "Crossways"). You might remember from our Spring 2020 newsletter that the Yes Pa Program, originally instituted by local entrepreneur and WWII veteran Frederick Sarkis, has blossomed at Newman ever since it received an \$80,000 foundational endowment from Sarkis himself in the summer of 2019. Since then, the Newman Community has augmented the Yes Pa character education curriculum to be utilized in the Dominican Republic and in future tutoring/ mentoring programs with the Boys & Girls Clubs of Rochester.

Because of the tireless work of one of our Advisory Board members, Ann Kubarek, Newman was gifted over \$25,000 to transform lives of the vulnerable throughout Rochester and beyond in direct support of the Yes Pa Program! A massive thank you goes out to the ESL Community Impact Grant, the John F. ### A Word from the Back Office

As this pandemic winds closer and closer to a more "permanent" solution, and the constancy and rigor of the scientific method remind me of how fortunate we are in today's technologically advanced world, I find myself taking time lately to reflect on the vibrancy and vitality of the power of the Holy Spirit!


